Spring Speaker Series Emphasizes Research Findings

Sensory integration dysfunction/sensory processing disorder exists when sensory signals don't get organized into appropriate responses. Pioneering occupational therapist and neuroscientist A. Jean Ayres, Ph.D., compared these conditions to a neurological "traffic jam"that prevents certain parts of the brain from receiving the information needed for daily events (Ayres, 1972 & 2005).

Sensory integration allows a person to organize sensations from the environment and from within a person's body to engage in meaningful activities such as play or self-care.

Autism Delaware is bringing a series of speakers to talk about their autism research and practice, representing a range of perspectives and positions. Dr. Janelle Love, our first speaker, is a parent and a board certified family physician who practices with a functional medicine approach. After her son's autism diagnosis, Dr. Love investigated the potential therapies for problems children with autism have, particularly looking at inflammation, infections, food intolerances, oxidative stress, and environmental triggers these children face.

As she changed her approach, she learned that many of the therapies for the kids with autism helped other conditions for adults and typical children. Her training has lead to treating individuals for severe neurological conditions such as ALS, MS, Alzheimer's, and Parkinson's, Chronic Fatigue Syndrome, fibromyalgia, ADHD, allergies,

depression, anxiety, OCD, environmental toxicities, and much more. In 2009 she published three books for children about the medical issues of autism from a biomedical perspective. Her belief is that genetics does not cause epidemics...so what does?

Dr. Love's presentation will be completed by the time this issue comes out, but you may learn more about her at http://www. autismbusters.com/.

Representing another perspective will be Dr. John Moeschler, who comes to us through collaboration with Christiana Care, the Interagency Coordinating Council, and the Center for Disabilities Studies. Board certified in pediatrics and medical genetics, Dr. Moeschler is a Professor of Pediatrics at Dartmouth Medical School; the Director of the Division of Clinical Genetics. Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center and the Children's Hospital at Dartmouth. He has a longstanding interest in clinical genetics, congenital malformations, developmental disabilities, and dysmorphology (the study of birth defects that affect the anatomy) as well as interest in public health and healthcare improvement. His research focuses on individuals with disabilities. neurodevelopmental disabilities and the delineation of genetic syndromes. He will be speaking on the genetics of autism and autistic spectrum disorders and the importance of early identification.

it. For younger parents I can see how it would be a good glimpse into the lives of a family growing with autism from birth to adulthood. You may want to try it out if you have not read it. You are welcome to borrow our copy!

I still believe the most significant value each of us brings to our community is ourselves, our experiences and our willingness to support each other. Spring Speaker Series Emphasizes Research Findings

Dr. Moeschler recently wrote in an e-mail to Citizen, "Clearly the cause of autism can be genetic, but the mechanisms appear to be complex and there may be 'environmental' factors that remain elusive."

Dr. Moeschler will be speaking at the Christiana Care Ammon Center on April 12 at 7 pm. This session will be free to the entire public.

Our last speaker, Kimberly Mollo, a graduate assistant at the Sensory Integration Laboratory, a research center of the Department of Occupational Therapy at Thomas Jefferson University will represent Dr. Roseann Schaaf, an internationally recognized expert in sensory integration in occupational therapy and known academically for her research in pediatric occupational therapy. Most parents of children with autism know their child has some sensory issues but we continue hear there is no such thing. Fortunately, there is a developing body of literature to support the parent's view. Dr. Schaaf's intent is to increase knowledge of sensory processing and its effect on children and adults. The Sensory Lab examines the physical reaction to sensations, and behavioral markers of sensory reactivity through questionnaires and interviews about everyday activities and sensory preferences. The Lab is also looking at the effectiveness of occupational therapy interventions for sensory integration/sensory processing disorders. Kimberly will be talking about the findings of their research,

Autism Delaware is interested in bringing a variety of viewpoints about autism and emerging research findings.

Legislative Corner

Roy LaFontaine of the Division of Developmental Disabilities Services announced at the Joint Finance Committee that the state will fund the 77 special school graduates for 2011. This was a major concern, and Autism Delaware banded together with all the provider and advocacy agencies to support this funding.

Thanks to the folks who testified at the hearings or who showed up to support us. Mike Bashkow, mom Karen, and Ben opened the testimony followed by Barry Sipple with his wife Angie and son Jacob. Pat Swanson and Mark Churra also testified about what it means to have services. Now our efforts need to turn to three other issues.



- 1. SB204 will require insurance coverage for basic therapies for children with autism. Insurance coverage will help our kids get speech, physical and occupational therapy and ABA based therapies. Insurance is needed not only to supplement therapies provided through the DAP, but even more for children educated in their home schools. By helping our families pay for these critically needed therapies, SB204 will reduce the reliance on public resources.
- 2. Reinstate the \$2.9 million that was cut from the DDDS budget. DDDS has sustained a 5% cut to their core budget which primarily supports adults with disabilities.

These cuts will affect psychiatric services, dental and other health-related services. Cuts in psychiatric services will reduce medication monitoring, which becomes a health and safety issue because our adults often take a variety of psychotropic drugs with long term effects. And finally, basic provider rates may be cut to expand the number of people served. Providers have not had an increase in rate since 2002 and have already covered increases in utilities, gasoline, food, and wages. An additional cut in rates will impact staff and the quality of service.

Additionally, there are emergency funds budgeted for only six or seven individuals to enter residential placement. Typically DDDS has up to 40 emergency placements each year. Without that funding, how can they support an adult whose parent dies or becomes unable to care for their adult child? Emergencies won't go away! Where will the people who need help go?

3. School funding issues. We need to ensure that changes to Title 14 regarding staffing for special education students in Delaware schools will not reduce the access of Delaware Autism Program students to speech language pathologists or school psychologists. The move to needs-based funding is changing the safety net that students with autism have had for the past 30 years that ensures the ratio of speech therapists and psychologists. Losses in these services will impact the program.

We need you to get involved. Please check our website at http://www.delautism.org/Advocacy/advocacygetinvolved.html where an action kit has been posted and is being kept updated as issues change or progress. Join the legislative committee. Meet with your legislators and host a meeting with legislators and other parents. Write letters. We must work together and our voice must be unified with many speakers bringing up the same issues.

DDDS Webpage Devoted to Autism

As we advised last summer, DDDS is developing an Autism and Asperger Resource Center without any funding, which is a challenge. A small group, including Melissa Tice Martin of LDAF, Theda Ellis of Autism Delaware, Melinda South of Keystone and Kent Riegel serve on this group. The first accomplishment has been to get a website up and running that is devoted to autism and Asperger resources in Delaware and autism websites around the country. The site is at http://www.dhss.delaware.gov/ddds/aar.html. It's in the beginning stages so look for improvements and additions over time.

Another goal is to make sure information about adult services is more easily accessible. DDDS will be posting their Guide to Developmental Disabilities Services shortly, which gives an excellent overview of adult services for folks with developmental disabilities and how to access the adult system.

Everyone is concerned about the issue of training in this environment with such a great need and very few resources. The Advisory Group is looking at online training resources and how we can pool our efforts to make online training on autism more affordable and more accessible to parents and service providers. Online training has been very well developed both through the College of Direct Supports and Innovative Learning. The benefit is that learning can take place at your convenience, then supplemented with a mentoring/coaching trainer on an itinerant basis. It does away with the need for programs to have their own full time training staff and the need to send people to a central place.

And finally, we are looking for two or three parents or adults with autism who would be willing to serve on this committee to bring your perspective. The group meets once each month for two hours. 

The AWARES group is a pilot group sponsored by Autism Delaware for adults with Asperger's. The name stands for Adults with Asperger's Recreation, Education and Social and the intent is to offer recreation opportunities and support in social areas for the Asperger's community. The group is governed by its members and facilitated by POW&R staff Rachel Donaldson and Shaheda Pine and Public Alley Colin Barratt.

The pilot group will last through April while the group figures out its direction. Folks are meeting four times a month with two planning meetings and two recreation activities. Meetings take place at the Autism Delaware office the second and fourth Tuesday of the month from 7-8:30pm. Topics of discussion and recreation sites are chosen by the members. 

POW&R Is Moving South

POW&R should be getting established in Kent County through a satellite job site at Dover Downs in the late spring of 2010. Matt Linder will be the lead staff person, and he'll be working initially with current POW&R participants. This opportunity allows us to expand without requiring additional resources. Matt will continue

to be housed out of our Newark office. By being able to establish a work site in a community business, it offers POW&R the opportunity to have a clustered site for job assessment, training and placement in Kent County. We want to thank Pete Bradley and Mark Rossi of Dover Downs for making this possible. Once we are well established at Dover Downs, we will look to expand in Kent County.

Additionally, the board is making a commitment to establish POW&R in Sussex County by June 2012. This will depend on two things - that we can attract participants and families to choose POW&R as their service provider, and that the state continues funding for adult services. Our goal is to start with one or two adults and hopefully some students through the Early Start to Supported Employment and build slowly, as we have done in New Castle County, Local families are working with us to identify potential funding sources and to write grants to help with start-up costs. The Lower Delaware Autism Foundation is working closely with us to make this happen as well. Cross your fingers; say a prayer, and help us expand this service statewide.
